Increase the availability of AOD treatment services, including specific services for Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander peoples, by continuing to commission in scope AOD treatment that aligns with local needs.

Description of Activity

Commission a range of AOD treatment services, including Aboriginal specific services, to achieve the following outcomes:

- Increased access to treatment services that cater to a person's holistic needs and to priority populations
- Seamless pathways of care for people as they move through their treatment journey.

Commission an evaluation of the AOD Program to achieve the following outcomes:

- Ensure CESP HN AOD commissioned services support the DHDA Drug and Alcohol Treatment Activities Schedule aims and objectives, provide adequate access, effective outcomes and positive consumer experience.
- Identify any gaps or limitations to address and opportunities for improvement in implementation.

Existing Activity

Program Key Priority Area

Alcohol and other drugs

Activity Aim

Increase access to effective, timely, coordinated and person centred AOD treatment in the primary care setting.

Description of Activity

This activity includes:

- Commissioning a shared care project to assist specialist AOD services and GPs to work together to provide care for people with substance use disorders.
- Supporting GPs to enhance uptake of drug and alcohol treatment including screening, brief intervention, withdrawal, referral, and planning and coordination of treatment for severe substance use disorder.
- Developing referral pathways between primary care and specialist drug and alcohol treatment services and the promotion of PHN Clinical Referral Pathways.
- Promoting opportunities for GPs and pharmacists to engage in Opioid Substitution Program (OTP).
- Linking prescribers with education and support regarding pharmaceutical drug misuse.
- Supporting and building the capacity of GPs and other primary care practitioners during the introduction of take-home Naloxone and depot Buprenorphine.
- Promoting education activities to strengthen the capacity of GP and other health professionals to address AOD issues in the community.
- Implementing primary care telehealth alcohol withdrawal program.

The expected outcomes are:

- Increased number of people supported in primary healthcare setting.
- Increased integration between primary health specialist and community based treatment services.
- Increased awareness and use of PHN Clinical Referral Pathways and Drug and Alcohol Specialist Advisory Service (DASAS).
- Referral links made between GPs and allied health providers, including pain

management specialists.

- Reduction in over-prescribing of pharmaceutical opioids.
 - Increased number of GPs and pharmacies involved in OTP.
- Increased number of GPs providing withdrawal support in the primary care setting.
- Increased number of GPs who participate in AOD training and education.

Program Key Priority Area

Alcohol and other drugs

Activity Aim

To ensure the provision of high quality and evidenced based AOD treatment to CESPHN priority populations through sector and workforce development initiatives.

Description of Activity

This activity includes:

- Disseminating best practice guidelines to AOD treatment providers on delivering services to Aboriginal and/ or Torres Strait Islander peoples, delivering workshops on the implementation of these guidelines and measuring their use and impact.
- Disseminating best practice guidelines to AOD treatment providers on delivering services to multicultural communities, undertaking organisational audit and implementation workshops and measuring impact.
- Commissioning and facilitating access to education and other workforce development initiatives that improve capacity of the AOD workforce to address the needs of CESPHN's priority populations.
- The expected outcomes are services that are culturally appropriate for Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander peoples and multicultural communities, and an AOD workforce that is skilled to meet the needs of priority populations.
