We Can't Wait to Act on Viral Hepatitis!

<u>World Hepatitis Day</u> on 28 July is reminder to test, treat or link your patients into care for hepatitis C. This year's theme 'We're not waiting' is a call to accelerate elimination efforts of viral hepatitis and the urgent need for testing and treatment for the people who need it.

In 2016 a cure for Hepatitis C became available on the PBS for everybody with a Medicare Card regardless of their ongoing risks.

Our local GPs have been doing a great job of curing hepatitis C, prescribing 29% of hepatitis C treatments in CESPHN between 2016 and 2021.

The estimated prevalence of hepatitis C in CESPHN is greater than the national average, and it is estimated that 8,400 people in CESPHN are still living with hepatitis C who need to be cured. We need to find and treat these people if we are to reach the NSW Goal to end Hepatitis C by 2028.

South Eastern Sydney Local Health District, Sydney Local Health District and CESPHN can GP support in identifying and managing their patients living with hepatitis C. These initiatives include:

- Community Nurse Consultants are available to help your practice with strategies for identifying and recalling patients at risk of chronic hepatitis C, staging of liver disease (FibroScan assessment, APRI AST to Platelet Ration Index scoring) and support in prescribing Hepatitis C treatments. - Tools such as <u>POLAR</u> can identify patients who have been previously diagnosed or who are at risk
 of hepatitis C. QI PIPs are available speak to CESPHN about accessing this program with a viral
 hepatitis quality improvement project.
- <u>HealthPathways</u> have been developed to provide clinicians with information regarding management of hepatitis C and B including referral pathways.
- Beyond the C program is designed to guide general practices in quality improvement activities. On completion of the program practices receive an incentive payment of \$1500 and contribute to your RACGP CPD hours under the Measuring Outcomes category
- Projects such as <u>Motivate C</u> provide offers of cash rewards to encourage people living with hepatitis C to seek treatment.
- Alternative methods of testing are available through the <u>NSW Dried Blood Spot Project</u> and the <u>Kirby Institute Point of Care Testing</u> for hepatitis C. Both projects allow for diagnosis through a finger stick blood spot. These can be accessed through the Local Health District Nurse Consultants.
- CESPHN has its own <u>Hepatitis Strategy 2021-2025</u> which provides guidance to support GPs in managing hepatitis.
